OAA State Plan on Aging Requirements Checklist



In August 2021, the Administration for Community Living (ACL) released State Unit on Aging Directors Letter #01-2021 that detailed new guidance for state aging agencies development of State Plans on Aging (SPA) under the Older Americans Act (OAA). The guidance included several updates and changes from prior guidance, including changes that reflected the 2020 reauthorization of the OAA. To support state aging agency development of their SPAs in line with the new guidance, ADvancing States has adapted a tool originally developed by the Ohio Department of Aging that other states can use to review their SPA drafts and ensure fidelity to the guidance. This new document joins a toolbox of other ADvancing States resources on SPA development to support states, including:

- Tools for Planning Developing a State Plan on Aging. This resource provides ideas and identifies decision
 points for state aging agency directors/staff as they develop SPAs, including environmental scanning, goals and

Finally, Congress provided significant increases in funding some of which remain available until expended.
